GEAR UP begins fourth year

aywood County GEAR UP TN will begin its fourth year in Haywood County Schools during the 2015-2016 school year. The GEAR UP Grant is a seven-year federal grant, that has matching funds from the City of Brownsville, and is administered by the state of Tennessee to help students get college and career ready. It began providing services in January of 2013 to the Class of 2018 and every class of seniors for the next seven years. It increases the number of students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education.

The Haywood County GEAR UP Site Coordinator is Jackie Whitten. The grant provides many services throughout the year that benefit students and parents, such as ACT Prep Classes on Saturdays, English tutoring during the school day, college tours, job shadowing, job site visits, summer enrichment camps, individual and group college planning sessions, and College App Week. GEAR UP held the first College Signing Day on May 6 at Haywood High School. This was a special event that celebrated the choice students made to attend college. Over 100 students participated in this event and many chose to announce their names and the college they planned to attend in the fall, with great applause from those students and adults who attended this recognition ceremony. Special speakers were Mayor Bill Rawls, Shayla Guy, West GEAR UP TN Regional Coordinator, and Mary Laphen, Statewide Services Coordinator, and Haywood County Schools Superintendent, Teresa Russell.

GEAR UP also partners with various individuals and organizations. The recent "Walk and Line Dance with Drew and Friends" held on May 23 had over 60 participants walking and line dancing. GEAR UP partnered with **Drew Magruder** from the Healthy Haywood Coalition; **Karen Jones**, TSU Extension Agent; and **Opal Hay**, Haywood County Schools Parent/Family Coordinator, to provide community awareness of the services provided by each of these organizations. It was a great success and more walk and line dances are being planned for the future.

GEAR UP provided uprising 10th grade students with the opportunity to attend two job-shadowing camps during the summer. The "Learners to Leaders Camp" provided training about job shadowing and set up job shadowing opportunities for students with different individuals, businesses, and government offices. Students job shadowed optometrists, dentists, an electrician, physical therapist, police officer, real estate agent, principal, accountant, hair stylist, chiropractor, and other people in Haywood County. The job shadowing experience gave each student a first-hand look at the types of work done by the people in those occupations so they can make better decisions in their future when deciding on a college degree and career.

Seniors had the opportunity to attend the GEAR UP TN Rising Senior Camp at the University of Memphis at Lambuth. One of the highlights of the GEAR UP program is

the opportunity for students in the class of 2018 to apply and possibly be chosen to attend the GEAR UP TN Youth Summit. The yearly summit brings more than 200 students, along with school administrators, and parents, to a university so students can become totally immersed in college life by participating in challenging activities that impels them to use their leadership, team-building and critical skills to complete all their given tasks. Students stay on a college campus for two and a half days, sleep in dorms, and dine on campus. This year, nine tenth-grade students went to the summit at Middle Tennessee State University to participate in activities with students across the state of Tennessee.

Site Coordinator, Jackie Whitten, believes the efforts of the GEAR UP program, along with the Tennessee Promise, can make a real difference in the number of college-bound students. The Promise provides students two years of tuition-free attendance at a community or technical college in Tennessee. "It's an exciting time for the students in Haywood County, and we welcome these opportunities for students to get the knowledge needed to prepare for college and the financial assistance they need to pay for their education after high school. College is now a reality for students and we will see an increase in the number of first generation college students." **HCS**

Summer Express Program a great success!

he Haywood County Extended Learning Summer Express Program, directed by Ms. Catherine Lester, was a huge success! More than 100 students, ranging in grades K-7, engaged in various learning opportunities including technology, art, chess, science, foreign languages, and entrepreneurship, among other subjects.

Students were privileged to visit both the Alex Haley Museum in Henning, Tennessee, and the Casey Jones Museum located in Jackson. Both field trips were a means to expose students to the rich history of the surrounding areas. Another delight for students was the various speakers, including a visit from Mayor **Bill Rawls**, who shared valuable information with the students.

The Summer Express staff members worked very hard to insure that each student attending the program would have a rich, fulfilling experience. Overall, the outcome was very favorable, and each student was impacted in a positive and enriching way. **HCS**







April School Board meeting

embers of the Haywood County School Board met in regular session on Tuesday, April 14. After members approved the agenda, Superintendent **Teresa Russell** shared her celebration of schools. Board members also approved a policy change, mini-grants, and added days to the school calendar for HHS students and teachers, among other business.

Mrs. Russell talked about the HHS Tomcats winning the state basketball championship and HHS FCCLA students who performed well at the state competition and will be going to the national contest. She also reported that Senator **Dolores Gresham** visited Haywood Elementary on April 10, welcomed several student authors from Haywood Elementary and students from HMS who are learning about robotics.

In other business the board approved on first reading a policy change recommended by the Tennessee School Boards Association. Policy #64001 added wording that limits methods of student identification such as the collection of biometric data without prior written consent from parents. This policy covers student surveys, analyses and evaluations.

Board members also approved four mini-grants. **Kellie Haywood** at East Side Intermediate will use her grant to purchase the software, Study Island for Math Success. **Amelia Morrison**, a teacher from Haywood Elementary, will use her funds to purchase two HKC 8" 8GB Memory Dual Core Tablets. This will help students develop math skills. Also from East side Intermediate, **Chelsea Currie** will use her grant to subscribe to the iXL.com website to further develop her students' math skills. From Haywood High School, **John Cunningham** will purchase calculators for students to be successful in taking Chemistry I.

Instead of adopting textbooks, which was on the agenda, Mrs. Russell asked board members to make a blanket adoption so that when the state completes its review of the standards for the different subject areas, the appropriate books may be adopted. They approved the blanket adoption.

Although the board voted to approve that the high school be closed two days for the state basketball tournament, those days must be made up, according to state rules. Mrs. Russell announced at the meeting that the school calendar for the last week of school was May 18 and 19 with students out on the May 20 and teachers having a stockpile day, then teachers and students had one-half day on May 21. Now, HHS teachers will make up the stockpile day on Saturday, May 16, then students and teachers will attend school May 18-21 all day and one-half day on Friday, May 22.

Board members approved Parents and Educators for Progress (PEP) as a School Support Organization 501(C) (3) status. They also set Wednesday, April 29, as the date for their Annual Board Retreat.

The April meeting is when the board decides on how many scholarships and what amount will be given from the

Catherine Colhoun Scholarship Fund. **Allen Currie** and Harrison Jones serve on the Scholarship Committee, and Deputy Superintendent **Vincent Harvell** reported that the Colhoun Scholarship Fund has a balance of \$217,838. In the past, the board has approved six scholarships for \$2,000 each so board members agreed to give the six scholarships again this year. Mr. Currie and Mr. Jones will be meeting soon with the HHS guidance counselors to select seniors who will be recipients of the scholarships.

Mr. Harvell reported that the schools had received the Haywood County School District audit for the year ending June 30, 2014, and that there were no findings.

Board members approved the purchase of a 2004 GMC Yukon for \$9,800 for the school system. This vehicle is replacing a van and will be used by teachers to attend professional development and the board when they attend meetings.

They approved a contract with Trane for the Chiller Service Agreement for the unit at Haywood High School. It is a three-year contract for about \$113,000. This includes inspections and some parts if repairs are needed. They also approved setting a budget amount for a new roof needed for East Side Intermediate. The \$625,000 set aside for this major project will come from the schools' fund balance. If this is the cost of the roof, the fund balance will be about \$1.67 million.

Mrs. Russell invited **Abby Nichols** to speak to the board and guests after business.

She works for TSAC, Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation. TSAC is the state agency that administers the Hope Lottery Scholarship, TN Promise, TN reconnect, and Dual enrollment. She discussed the Drive to 55 initiatives (TN Promise and TN Reconnect) primarily. According to Mrs. Nichols, Tennessee Promise offers two years of tuition-free community or technical college to Tennessee high school graduates beginning with the Class of 2015. Tennessee Promise is a last-dollar scholarship, meaning it will cover college costs not met from Pell, HOPE, or TSAA.

Tennessee Reconnect is the Drive to 55 initiative to help more adults complete a postsecondary degree or credential. Tennessee has between 900,000 and 1 million adults with some college but no degree. Mrs. Nichols said, "It is impossible to achieve the mission of the Drive to 55 without re-engaging these students and helping them finish their degree or certificate. As part of Tennessee Reconnect, all Tennessee adults can now attend and earn a diploma or certificate at any of our 27 Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology (TCATs) completely free of tuition and fees." Mrs. Russell thanked Mrs. Nichols for her presentation.

The next board meeting will be held on May 12 at 6 p.m. HCS

Haywood County School Board earns "Board of Distinction" recognition

Haywood County ****he School Board was recognized at its meeting Tuesday night, May 12, as a Tennessee School Board Association Board of Distinction, highlighting outstanding board performance. Marty Burlison, board member in Tipton County and Tennessee School Boards Association Delta District Director, was on hand to make the presentation. This award, one of TSBA's most prestigious, celebrates the achievements of those boards that have met the challenge of leadership in every area of their board responsibility. Mr Burlison said that the Haywood County Board is one of a select few boards that earn this designation. The HCS Board has been a Board of Distinction since 1990.

In other business at the meeting, Superintendent **Teresa Russell**

recognized students and several events that have happened in the schools in the last few weeks. She announced the success that the HHS Baseball Tomcats are having, vying for the Region 8AA Championship on Wednesday against Ripley. The Soccer Tomcats are also having great success this year playing in the Region 8AA semifinal game Tuesday. Mrs. Russell also introduced Ebony Clark who read a poem to the board and visitors. She presented this poem at Mayor Bill Rawls' Save Our Streets event at the high school recently. GEAR UP held its first College Signing Day on May 6, featuring more than 100 HHS seniors announcing where they are going to college. Also Mrs. Russell introduced two new 30+ Club members, Audrey Davis and Dustin Milton. These students scored a 30 or above on the ACT. Audrey is the daughter of **Julie** and **Stark Davis**, and Dustin is the son of Chris Milton and Jackie Inman.

Mrs. Russell and the board met for their annual board retreat on April 29, and among other business they discussed, they conducted Mrs. Russell's evaluation. Board Chairman **Harold Garrett** said it was a favorable evaluation. Mr. Garrett said while giving Mrs. Russell a raise would be warranted based on her performance and what other area superintendents are paid, she told him she wouldn't accept a raise.

Board members approved several out-of-town trips for school groups. HHS HOSA advisor **Julie Taylor** will take

one student to the HOSA National Leadership Conference in Anaheim, California in June. **Denita Jarratt** will take three CTE students to the National FCCLA Star Events contest in Washington, D. C., in July. They also approved two trips for Mrs. **Jackie Whitten** to take students to MTSU on one trip and to Fort Campbell, Kentucky, and Austin Peay State on the other trip. Principal **Yvette Blue** of the Haywood Middle School received permission for the use of a school bus, to be driven by Mr. **Nick Korn**, to take students to the Kids Across American campsite in Branson, Missouri, in late May and early June.

The board, upon the recommendation of Mrs. Russell, approved the start-up of the Haywood Tomcat Pom Squad, a new extracurricular activity at Haywood High School.

Board members agreed to study the schools' policy manual and discuss any changes that they recommend to be considered at the June board meeting. Before budget amendments were read, Deputy Superintendent **Vincent Harvell** reported that the balance of the Catherine Truss Colhoun Trust has a balance of \$217,838. Board members agreed last month to give six \$2,000 scholarships to HHS graduates this year.

The next meeting will be held on June 9 at 6 p.m. HCS

School Board meets on June 9

Superintendent of Schools Teresa Russell opened the June HCS School Board meeting with her celebration of schools. She read to board members, guests and HHS Basketball Coach Kendall Dancy Resolution 313 of the Tennessee House of Representatives, which gave special recognition to the Haywood High Men's Basketball team that won the Division 1 Class AA State Championship. The resolution gave the team's winning statistics for the year and expressed great pride in its accomplishments. Sponsoring the resolution was Haywood County Representative Craig Fitzhugh and State Senator Delores Gresham.

Mrs. Russell also recognized the success of the Summer Express program, a nine-day summer program that offers special learning opportunities for the 137 students who participated. She said in addition to the classroom activities, students enjoyed two field trips. Mrs. Russell also shared with board members a report she received from the Family Resource Centers, one located at Anderson and one at Haywood Elementary. She said that 2,236 students used the centers, and that families checked out more than 7,000 items. She also reported that the Book Jam program was a great success with 1,728 students receiving free books, and in their programs, Haywood County students read more than 76,000 books.

Attending the meeting were board members Harold Garrett, Allen Currie, Olivia Farrington and Harrison Jones. Board member Greg Vanstory was out of town on business. In other business, board members approved the 2016 fiscal year Local Consolidated Application for students with disabilities under the No Child Left Behind law. They also approved to operate under a continuation budget until passage of the 2015-16 county budget by the Haywood County Commission. Superintendent Russell asked board members to approve the application process for two new Tornado Safe Space grants, one to be built at Haywood High and one to be built at East Side Intermediate School. This was approved.

Board members did not approve the superintendent's request to reappoint the current members of the Disciplinary Hearing Authority. Board member Olivia Farrington asked the board why they did not appoint members to the authority as it states in Policy 6.317. She said, "Either we need to go by the policy or change it." Mrs. Russell said that she requested the reappointments because she believed that the current authority members are doing a good job, and this is the way it has been done. After a discussion about the policy and the authority members, the board agreed to table the item on the agenda until Mrs. Russell can discuss the policy with HCS attorneys. Currently serving on the authority are Art Garrett, Kenneth Emerson, Samuel Carney, Dorothy Bond, Opal Hay and as an alternate, Marjorie Vaulx.

Board members discussed the next item on the agenda – bonuses for coaches. Besides coaches, the list included

sponsors of Career and Technical groups, the band and several other groups. After much discussion, the item did not pass when Olivia Farrington and Harrison Jones voted yes and Allen Currie and Harold Garrett voted no.

Mrs. Russell had on the agenda her new organizational chart, but asked to delay presenting this item until she has time to make some changes.

Board members approved the request from Mr. Vincent Harvell and Mrs. Russell for approval to schedule a company to repair the gym floor at Haywood Middle School. It seems the wood floor is rising in a big area due to a moisture problem. Insurance representatives have said they are not responsible for this damage, but they are waiting on a report from an engineer on the exact cause of the damage. The company they want to hire, "Sports Flooring," is a part of the National Joint Power Alliance, of which HCS is a member, so they don't have to bid out the project since other areas schools have used this company on similar projects. The estimated cost for the project will be \$22,556.

After board members approved some budget amendments, but before closing, Mrs. Russell set up a budget meeting with budget committee members Harold Garrett and Allen Currie for next Tuesday, June 16.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, July 14, at 6 p.m. HCS

GoNoodle makes you smarter!

Haywood County Schools is participating in an online physical activity program that increases attention skills, focusing, and retention of classwork. The school garden will share its yield with the cafeterias of Haywood County Schools in an effort to get students to eat more fruits and/or vegetables. Mrs. Joni Taylor's fifth-grade class has taken on the garden as a project. They will "tend on" the garden throughout the summer. Project Managers for the class are Ava Adams and Jennifer Moses. An additional school employee will also oversee the project over the summer. It was fun watching them and the other students plant the garden. HCS

East Side Walks Across Tennessee ...17 times



Students at East Side participated in an eight-week physical activity program sponsored by Coordinated School Health and UT Extension 4-H program. They recorded the number of minutes spent doing any physical activity each day, then turned in weekly log sheets to their teachers. Each 15 minutes of activity equaled "one mile." CSH kept the data and totals. Students had a hard time coming up with physical activities during the snow and icy months, but at the end of the program here's what they had:

Fifth grade logged 66,060 minutes of physical activity, equal to 4,404 (15 minute) miles, equal to walking across TN 10.0 times! The fifth-grade class that logged the most time was Ms. **Katrina Hill**'s class.

Fourth grade logged 46,375 minutes of physical activity, equal to 3.091 (15 minute) miles, equal to walking across TN 7.02 times! The fourth-grade class that logged the most time was Ms. **Jennifer Emerson**'s class!

Three fourth-grade students individually logged the most physical activity and received a small prize for that. They were: **Jeb Banks**, for 2,942 physical activity minutes; **Leighanna Baker**, for 1,765 physical activity minutes; and **Molly Nichols**, for 1,275 physical activity minutes. 
